Road Reconstruction - Municipal Class EA Study and Preliminary Design

St. Ann's Road, West Lincoln

The Study

The Township of West Lincoln has initiated a Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA Schedule B) to evaluate and recommend transportation improvements along St. Ann's Road between Regional Road 20 and Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road). The purpose of this Class EA is to review, study and recommend improvements to St. Ann's Road and mitigate any negative environmental impacts. The Township has also chosen to include intersection improvements, drainage improvements, bridge rehabilitation and railway crossing improvements along with the road reconstruction. The Class EA will examine various design options to be used later for a detailed design.

The Process

The project is being planned in accordance with Schedule "B" of the Municipal Engineers Association (MEA) Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) guidelines (October 2000, as amended in 2007 & 2011), which is approved under the *Ontario Environmental Assessment Act*.

Public Information Center

It was brought to our attention that due to a clerical issue; some residents did not receive notice of the first Public Information Center (PIC). 

INTRODUCTION

The Township of West Lincoln is currently undertaking a Class Environmental Assessment Study for St. Ann's Road between Regional Road 20 and Regional Road 69, in the Township of West Lincoln. The purpose for undertaking this study is to confirm the need/justification for roadway improvements and infrastructure enhancements along the subject portion of the roadway and to develop a design that addresses traffic needs, roadway drainage, pedestrian and cyclist requirements and municipal servicing requirements. In accordance with Ontario's Environmental Assessment Act, the Township has planned this project under Schedule "B" of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment Act.

The purpose of this information package is threefold:

- To provide an overview of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment Process;
- To explain the role of the public in the process and opportunities to get involved and;
- To provide a general project background

ONTARIO ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMNET ACT DESCRIPTION

The purpose of the Ontario Environmental Assessment Act (EA Act) is "the betterment of the people of the whole or any party of Ontario by providing protection, conservation and wise management in Ontario of the environment." Environment is applied broadly and includes the natural, social, cultural, built and economic components.

Environment Assessment (EA) is a decision-making process to promote good environmental assessment planning. The key features are:

- Early Consultation
- Consideration of a reasonable range of alternatives
- Assessment of Environmental effects
- Systematic evaluation of alternatives
- Clear documentation and traceable decision making

There are 2 basic types of EA processes:

- Individual EA
 - Requires Terms of Reference approved by the Ministry of the Environment (MOE)
 - Requires that EA report be submitted to MECP for review and approved by the Province
- Class EA

 Project is approved subject to compliance with an approved Class EA process for a group or "class" of project




There are four types of projects or activities for Class EA's:

- Schedule `A'
- Municipal maintenance, operational and emergency activities
- Pre-approved, therefore the municipality can proceed without further approval under the EA Act
- Schedule `A+' Pre-approved, however the public is to be advised prior to project implementation
- Schedule 'B' Projects with potential for some adverse environmental effects
 - These are approved subject to a screening process including consultation directly with affected properties and agencies
- Schedule 'C' Projects with the potential for significant environmental effects which must proceed under the planning and documentation procedures outlined in the Municipal Class EA document

This project is being conducted as a Schedule 'B' activity under the EA process as described above.

Public Involvement

The role of those members of the public with an interest in a study is to provide background information and to advise the proponent of their support and concerns, and to review and provide comments and input about the study findings.



Phase 1 - Problem or Opportunity Identify the Problem

This project aims to improve the quality, life cycle, and reliability of the roadway and bridge by ensuring structural pavement adequacy that meets today's engineering standards and by providing a safe road corridor for all users including motorists, cyclists and pedestrians.

Phase 2 - Alternative Solutions Identify Alternative Solutions to Problem or Opportunity

St. Ann's Road, is situated in the town of St. Ann's within The Township of West Lincoln. The existing two-lane local road runs through an agricultural and residential part of St. Ann's. The section from Regional Road 20 to Sixteen Road is a rural cross section that is devoid of sidewalks and sewers. The road drains to existing ditches and swales. The section of road from Sixteen Road to Regional Road 69 is a semi urban cross-section that drains to adjacent properties and an existing storm sewer. There is a single boulevard sidewalk located along the western side of the road. There is no curb or gutter on the street. The deteriorating road condition and public concern has prompted the Township to evaluate the reconstruction of the 1.5km portion of roadway. There are multiple intersecting streets (Regional Road 20, Sixteen Road, Attema Crescent and Regional Road 69). The Road also crosses Twenty Mile Creek and is crossed by an active railway line.

The existing road is generally 5.5m wide. This road consists of two (2) 2.6m wide lanes with gravel shoulders. The shoulders range in width of 0.3 to 1.0m. The road is surfaced drained to roadside ditches. There is an existing storm sewer located on the north and south side of the creek that outlets to the creek. The road currently has no accommodation for cyclists, nor are there any turning lanes provided at any of the intersections.

The road has a very narrow Right of Way with a width ranging from 35m (at the bridge) to as little as 10.4m. The Semi-urban section of the roadway from Sixteen Road to Regional Road 69 is generally very narrow with the back edge of the sidewalk and the edge of the existing asphalt abutting the property line in several locations.

Background Information

Traffic Study – A formal traffic study has not been commissioned. The Township provided traffic data from the period of April 28th 2021 to April 7th 2022. This

data was analyzed with Huston Radar Stats Pro Software. This analysis showed the following:

Sixteen Road to Regional Road 20

- Average Speed = 49.2 km/hr
- 85th percentile speed = 68 km/hr
- Average daily traffic = 172.7 vehicles

Sixteen Road to Attema Crescent

- Average Speed = 60.2 km/hr
- 85th percentile speed = 86 km/hr
- Average daily traffic = 102.2 vehicles

Attema Crescent to Regional Road 69

- Average Speed = 59.4 km/hr
- 85th percentile speed = 85 km/hr
- Average daily traffic = 119.9 vehicles

Stage 1 Archaeological Assessment – A Stage 1 Archaeological Assessment has been conducted on the study area. This assessment consisted of a detailed review of historical records and maps to identify any locations of historical significance. A site visit was also conducted to confirm the findings. The results of the Stage 1 Assessment indicated that 98% (1.15ha) of the study corridor has low archaeological potential due to being previously disturbed but, that the remaining 2% (0.02ha) should be investigated further through a Stage 2 Assessment.

Stage 2 Archaeological Assessment – Following the recommendations of the Stage 1 Archaeological Assessment, a Stage 2 Assessment has been recommended. The area of concern (shown below in green) is located on the northwest side of the bridge at Twenty Mile Creek. The Stage 2 Assessment is recommended to search for artifacts that may be buried beneath the surface and assess the need for a Stage 3 investigation.

The area in question is an urban landscape and is inaccessible by plough. Therefore, a test pit program is recommended to complete the requirements of the Stage 2 Archaeological Assessment. A grid of hand dug test pits at 5m intervals will be advanced in the area in question. These test pits will be advanced into the subsoil and will be 30cm in diameter and 5cm deep.

The Stage 2 Archaeological Assessment is expected to take place in summer 2022.



Geotechnical Investigation – A geotechnical investigation was conducted between November 4th and November 30th 2021. As part of O-Reg 406-19, and assessment of past uses was completed in October 2021. The report indicates that the existing road consists of 65mm to 265mm of asphalt underlain be 90mm to 510mm of granular base. Several boreholes indicated a second asphalt layer buried within the granular base. The environmental results of this report are pending.

Bridge Assessment – As part of this EA, an assessment was also carried out on the bridge structure. Golder and Associates performed a Bridge Condition Survey of Bridge 46 on July 27th, 2021. This assessment looks at various components of the bridge including core sampling and testing, an assessment of the deck wearing surface, approach slabs, expansion joints, deck drains, concrete curb and wing walls, sidewalk, wing walls, piers, and soffit. The results of this assessment were reviewed by discussed with Ellis Engineering. It was found that the bridge is in poor condition. Three options for rehabilitation were considered:

- Minor Rehabilitation Would require full replacement in +/- 20 years
- Major Rehabilitation Would require full replacement in +/- 30 years
- Full replacement within 5 years

At this time, miner rehabilitation is preferred. The railings on the bridge may need to be raised for minimum safety standards for cyclists. A cost estimate for the rehabilitation is being prepared by Ellis Engineering.

Preliminary Design Options – Several design options have been presented for review. These options are preliminary and as such, no detailed design aspects such grading, cross sectional review, storm sewer design or adjacent property drainage has been assessed. Preliminary "line work" has been shown on the plan drawings so that an assessment of property and utility conflicts can be identified. These plan drawings will also provide the stakeholders with an indication of the impacts the design options will pose. It must however be stressed that the full impact of the design options will not be realized until the detailed design has commenced. As such, the final **Preferred Design** may differ slightly from the proposed options or may include aspects from various options.

Do Nothing Alternative – One design option would be to do nothing and leave the current road platform as is. This option would not address any resident concerns, improve the deteriorating road platform, or make any accommodation for cyclists or pedestrians.

Regional Road 20 to Sixteen Road – This section of roadway is currently a rural cross section that drains to existing ditches and swales. The ditches all drain toward the Corrugated Steel Pipe (CSP) located 190m north of Regional Road 20. The existing asphalt surface is 6.2m wide complete with +/- 1.0m wide granular shoulders. The proposed design consists of 2 - 3.5m lanes for a 7.0m wide asphalt road. Granular shoulder rounding will transition the edge of the pavement to the ditches. Ditches will require regrading and cleaning and may require realignment due to the widened road surface. No sidewalks or bicycle lanes are proposed for this section of road.

Sixteen Road to Regional Road 69

Design Option 1 (7m Road) – This design will have the least amount of impact on the adjacent properties and environment. This design will also be the least expensive, as the road will be narrower than the other design options. This design would not make accommodation for cyclists and as such, the cyclists would have to share the road with traffic. The addition of barrier curb would also eliminate all on street or boulevard parking.


The design consists of 2 - 3.5m wide asphalt lanes complete with standard barrier curb and gutter. A 1.5m wide concrete sidewalk would be placed in the western boulevard close to the existing location. The existing sidewalk and utility poles have no protection from traffic. The addition of a barrier curb would suffice to protect pedestrians from errant vehicles. As barrier curb is 150mm high, the boulevard would have to be raised or the road would have to be lowered by 150mm. Lowering of the road may not be an option due to cover constraints on the existing utilities. Raising the boulevard may be problematic as it could block drainage from the adjacent properties and pond water at the property line. These grading concerns will not be fully realized until the grading has been examined.

The proposed curb and sidewalk are in conflict with approximately 8 utility poles. These poles would have to be relocated prior to construction. Relocation options for the west side poles will be limited as there are 2 gas mains that run close to the proposed curb. Placement of the poles behind the sidewalk will require property or easement acquisition.

The proposed curb is in direct conflict with the two gas mains at several locations. There is approximately 430m of gas main that is in conflict. Relocation of the gas would be very expensive considering that one of the mains is a 150mm Extra High-Pressure Main. However, the curb alone may not be problematic if the road grades are not dropped, and cover is maintained. Subdrain will be in conflict with the gas main, but this is easily mitigated by moving the subdrain into the road.

This design option would require lengthening of the existing storm sewer system to collect the water on the road from catch basins. It would be most likely that the entire storm sewer would require replacement. One advantage to installing a new storm sewer would the ability to place catchbasins behind the eastern curb and the sidewalk to collect water in low lying areas which will help to mitigate the grading concerns.

This design option fits within the existing ROW. As noted above, utility relocations may require easement or further property acquisition. This design option would also have the least impact on vegetation, trees gardens and the retaining wall at #2470. This design option would also cost the least.



Design Option 2 (8.5m Road with Curb and Gutter) -

The design consists of 2 - 4.25m wide asphalt lanes complete with standard barrier curb and gutter. A 1.5m wide concrete sidewalk would be placed in the western boulevard close to the existing location. The existing sidewalk and utility poles have no protection from traffic. The addition of a barrier curb would suffice to protect pedestrians from errant vehicles. As a typical barrier curb is 150mm high, the boulevard would have to be raised or the road would have to be lowered by 150mm. Lowering of the road may not be an option due to cover constraints on the existing utilities. Raising the boulevard may be problematic as it could block drainage from the adjacent properties and pond water at the property line. These grading concerns will not be fully realized until the grading has been examined.


The wider lanes would not provide enough width for dedicated bicycle lanes but, would create more room for cyclists to share the road with vehicular traffic. The added width however would likely result in greater vehicle speed as the wide travel platform would promote speeding and could leads to reduced safety. Traffic calming measures such as bump outs, planters and speed humps could be considered to mitigate this concern but could inhibit bicycle traffic.

The proposed curb and sidewalk are in conflict with approximately 15 utility poles. These poles would have to be relocated prior to construction. Relocation options for the west side poles will be limited as there are 2 gas mains that run close to the proposed curb. Many of the poles on the east side of the road would be within the proposed road surface so it is likely that both pole lines would need to be relocated.

The proposed curb is in direct conflict with the two gas mains at several locations. There is approximately 430m of gas main that is in conflict. Relocation of the gas would be very expensive considering that one of the mains is a 150mm Extra High-Pressure Gas Main. However, the curb alone may not be problematic if the road grades are not dropped and cover is maintained. Subdrain will be in conflict with the gas main but this is easily mitigated by moving the subdrain into the road away from the gas main.

This design option would require lengthening the existing storm sewer system to collect the water on the road. Most likely the entire storm sewer would require replacement. One advantage to installing a new storm sewer would be the ability to place catchbasins behind the eastern curb and the sidewalk to collect water in low lying areas which will help to mitigate the grading concerns.

This design does not fit within the existing ROW. Property acquisition at a minimum would be required at properties #2329, #2343, #2353, #2477, #2481, #2489 and #5488. Utility relocations may require easement or further property acquisition. This design option would require the removal 3 trees and various bushes and shrubs along the east side of the road.



Design Option 3 (8.5m Road without Curb and Gutter) -

The design consists of 2 - 4.25m wide asphalt lanes and a granular shoulder. A 1.5m wide concrete sidewalk would be placed in the western boulevard close to the existing location. The lack of barrier curb would mean that the utility poles and sidewalk would have no protection from vehicular traffic. Water would continue to drain to roadside ditches and swales as it currently does. A storm sewer may still be required so that catchbasins could be installed in low lying areas to collect water. The west side ditch would be placed between the sidewalk and road to help provide some protection from vehicles but as the ditches would be very shallow, this protection would be minimal.


The proposed road and sidewalk and in conflict with approximately 13 utility poles. These poles would have to be relocated prior to construction. As there is no barrier curb to protect the poles, they would ideally need to be placed outside of the clear zone for safety. This will require property or easement acquisition along each side of the road.

As there is no curb and gutter therefore subdrain would not be required. However, the Township may choose to include subdrain as the ditches will be very shallow and the subdrain will help to drain water from the road base.

This design option may require lengthening of the existing storm sewer system to collect the water on the road. Most likely that the entire storm sewer would require

replacement. One advantage to installing a new storm sewer would the ability to place catchbasins behind the eastern curb and the sidewalk to collect water in low lying areas which will help to mitigate the grading concerns.

This design does not fit within the existing ROW. Property acquisition at a minimum would be required at properties #2329, #2343, #2353, #2477, #2481, #2489 and #5488. Utility relocations may require easement or further property acquisition. This design option would require the removal 3 trees and various bushes and shrubs along the east side of the road.



Design Option 4 (10.0m Road) – The design consists of 2 - 3.5m wide asphalt lanes and two 1.5m wide bicycle lane complete with standard barrier curb and gutter. A 1.8m wide curb faced concrete sidewalk would be constructed on the west side of the road. The existing sidewalk and utility poles have no protection from traffic. The addition of a barrier curb would suffice to protect pedestrians from errant vehicles. As a typical barrier curb is 150mm high, the boulevard would have to be raised or the road would have to be lowered by 150mm. Lowering of the road may not be an option due to cover constraints on the existing utilities. Raising the boulevard may be problematic as it could block drainage from the adjacent properties and pond water at the property line. These grading concerns will not be fully realized until the grading has been examined.

This is the only design option that provides a dedicated space for cyclists. The added width would likely result in greater vehicle speed as the wide travel platform would promote speeding and could lead to reduced safety. Traffic calming measures such as bump outs and planters would not be an option as they would interfere with the bicycle lanes. Speedhumps could be implemented but would not cross the bicycle lanes.

This design is in conflict with approximately 35 utility poles. These poles would have to be relocated prior to construction. Relocation options for the west side poles will be limited as there are 2 gas mains that run close to the proposed curb. Many of the poles on the east side of the road would be within the proposed road surface so both pole lines would need to be relocated.


The proposed curb is in direct conflict with the two gas mains at several locations. There is approximately 430m of gas main that is in conflict. Gas relocation would be very expensive considering that one of the mains is a 150mm Extra High-Pressure Main.

However, the curb alone may not be problematic if the road grades are not dropped and cover is maintained. Subdrain will be in conflict with the main but this is easily mitigated by moving the subdrain into the road away from the gas main.

This design option would require lengthening of the existing storm sewer system to collect the water on the road. Most likely the entire storm sewer would require replacement. One advantage to installing a new storm sewer would the ability to place catchbasins behind the eastern curb and the sidewalk to collect water in low lying areas which will help to mitigate the grading concerns.

This design option is the widest and would therefore have the most impact on adjacent properties. Property acquisition at a minimum would be required at properties #2306, #2320, #2324, #2329, #2343, #2353, #2356, #2358, #2360, #2411, #2418, #2424, #2425, #2428, #2433, #2434, #2467, #2477, #2481, #2489 and #5488. Utility relocations will require easement or further property acquisition. This design option would require the removal of at least 13 trees and various bushes and shrubs along the east side of the road. The retaining wall at #2470 would also have to be reconstructed back behind the property line to accommodate the sidewalk.

As this design is the widest option, it will also be the most difficult to ensure positive drainage. Several catchbasins will be required behind the sidewalk and curb to collect water in lows spots and will likely require additional property acquisition.



Public Response

As mentioned, the purpose of the Class EA process is to create an avenue for the public to participate in the planning and design process, express their desires and concerns and for this information to be documented and replied to in a structured manner. The knowledge gained at this public information center will be used in the detailed design. For this reason, it is critical that any concerns or input the public have, be recorded on the pages provided and submitted so that they can be addressed in a timely fashion.



What is an Environmental Class Assessment Schedule?

Class Environmental Assessments (EA's) are separated into 4 classes. The class determines the level of engagement that the various stakeholders are to have during the evaluation process. The Class is determined by the type, projected cost and environmental and social impact the project will have.

Projects such as typical maintenance to roads and drainage systems typically have minimal impact and do not require much stakeholder engagement as the impact is minimal.

Some projects require the evaluation of various design options and have higher levels of stakeholder impacts. These projects must provide stakeholders with the opportunity to be engaged during the evaluation and to be able to provide feedback as part of the evaluation process.







Environmental Class Assessment Schedules

- Schedule 'A' Maintenance, operational and emergency activities These are Pre-Approved and do not require approval under the EA act
- Schedule 'A+' These projects are also Pre-Approved, but stakeholders are to be notified prior to construction
- Schedule 'B' These projects have the potential for adverse environmental impacts. These projects must undergo a screening process that includes direct consultation with affected stakeholders
- Schedule 'C' These projects will have a significant environmental impact. These projects require additional public consultation beyond a Schedule 'B'

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

Good morning Ray,

Regional Planning and Development Services staff has reviewed the Notice of Public Information Centre for the Municipal Class EA Study and Preferred Design and offer the following comments:

Archaeological Potential

The *Niagara Official Plan, 2022* ("NOP") Policy 6.4.2.4 states that EA projects undertaken by local municipalities will review the areas of archaeological potential on Schedule K of the NOP and determine if archaeological assessments are required as part of the Environmental Assessment process. Where a project is within an area of potential, the archaeological assessment should be initiated as part of the study process. I have attached a snip of our mapping demonstrating that the majority of properties are mapped as an area of archaeological potential (in green) and therefore recommend that a Stage 1 Archaeological Assessment (at minimum), completed by a licensed archaeologist is undertaken.

Natural Environment

The subject lands, as illustrated by the Notice, are impacted by the Region's Natural Environment System ("NES"), consisting of Provincially significant wetland ("PSW"), significant woodland, other woodland, other wetland, and permanent and intermittent watercourses. NOP Policy 3.1.9.5.3(c) allows for activities that create or maintain infrastructure authorized under an Environmental Assessment.

Thank you for sending us notification regarding (St. Ann's Road Reconstruction). In our preliminary assessment, we have confirmed that Hydro One has existing high voltage Transmission facilities within your study area. At this time we do not have sufficient information to comment on the potential resulting impacts that your project may have on our infrastructure. As such, we must stay informed as more information becomes available so that we can advise if any of the alternative solutions present actual conflicts with our assets, and if so; what resulting measures and costs could be incurred by the proponent. Note that this response does not constitute approval for your plans and is being sent to you as a courtesy to inform you that we must continue to be consulted on your project.

In addition to the existing infrastructure mentioned above, the applicable transmission corridor may have provisions for future lines or already contain secondary land uses (e.g., pipelines, watermains, parking). Please take this into consideration in your planning.

Also, we would like to bring to your attention that should (St. Ann's Road Reconstruction) result in a Hydro One station expansion or transmission line replacement and/or relocation, an Environmental Assessment (EA) will be required as described under the Class Environmental Assessment for Minor Transmission Facilities (Hydro One, 2016). This EA process would require a minimum of 6 months for a Class EA Screening Process (or up to 18 months if a Full Class EA were to be required) to be completed. Associated costs will be allocated and recovered from proponents in accordance with the Transmission System Code. If triggered, Hydro One will rely on studies completed as part of the EA you are current undertaking.

Consulting with Hydro One on such matters during your project's EA process is critical to avoiding conflicts where possible or, where not possible, to streamlining processes (e.g., ensuring study coverage of expansion/relocation areas within the current EA). Once in receipt of more specific project information regarding the potential for conflicts (e.g., siting, routing), Hydro One will be in a better position to communicate objections or not objections to alternatives proposed.

If possible at this stage, please formally confirm that Hydro One infrastructure and associated rights-of-way will be completely avoided, or if not possible, allocate appropriate lead-time in your project schedule to collaboratively work through potential conflicts with Hydro One, which ultimately could result in timelines identified above.

In planning, note that developments should not reduce line clearances or limit access to our infrastructure at any time. Any construction activities must maintain the electrical clearance from the transmission line conductors as specified in the Ontario Health and Safety Act for the respective line voltage.

Be advised that any changes to lot grading or drainage within, or in proximity to Hydro One transmission corridor lands must be controlled and directed away from the transmission corridor.





I am writing because we were recently made aware of township plans for bridge repairs and roadwork on our street and the possibility of widening the road. We were only informed by a neighbour who said not many people joined in the virtual meeting, I believe this is because nobody knew about it as we had no idea this meeting was taking place. After some searching, I found that residents would be notified through a local newspaper and the towns website, we don't always get or read a local newspaper and why would we check the towns website for something like that.

I understand that bridge and road repairs are necessary and I have no issues with that at all. My concern is that my house and direct neighbours houses are very close to the road, all that I can find is that the sidewalk would stay about where it is, I would like to know exactly how much closer the sidewalk will get to my house. The house across from us is only a few feet from the road so obviously the road can't get any closer to them which means it can only get closer to my house. The township might have a road easement, but we feel like we should at least be able to voice our concerns. Widening the road might make it safer for cyclists but less safe for my family, putting us closer to the road and traffic. Vehicles already drive too quickly down our street widening the road will only increase this issue. I have emailed the township, the region and the Niagara Regional Police about this issue in the past with little to no response.

My neighbours driveway is only long enough for one vehicle (two cars wide) so she cannot lose any more length to widening the road either. We live in a low-lying area so raising the sidewalk would trap more water on our property creating the possibility of water damage to our basements. We would like more information, to know what decisions have been made and to know about any further developments. Again I understand that some repair and roadwork is necessary but we cannot give up any more of our already small front yard, without compromising the safety of my family.

At this point I don't know what plans are in place for the road but the ditch on my side (west) has become more blocked over time. The culvert at my driveway is perhaps is too small to handle all the debris.

Currently it is 30' long by 20" wide, if possible I would like it widened to 40' long by 30" wide?

The property runs down to the 20 mile drain where there is a large culvert crossing the road from west to east, this culvert is almost always 3/4 full because of drainage east of the road. Back ups and debris impeads the flow and floods the ditch and back of the property. Reads and cattails also hold back garbage tossed , debris and invites rodents and muskrats.





Dear Mrs. Donna DeFilippis,

Following the federal Ministerial approval (April 20, 2020) of funding for the Reconstruction of St. Ann's Road Project (the Project) under the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP), Infrastructure Canada (INFC) has reviewed all information provided to date on the proposed Project to assess if there are any federal requirements under the *Impact Assessment Act* (IAA). INFC has also reviewed the information provided to determine INFC's obligation to consult with Canada's Indigenous Peoples, including the identification of next steps.

Impact Assessment Act Requirements

Based on the information provided by the Township of West Lincoln for this Project, INFC is of the opinion that there are no requirements under the *Impact Assessment Act*.

<u>Note</u>: INFC's understanding is that the Project is not located in whole or in part on federal lands, should this information change or be incorrect, please inform INFC as soon as possible.

Consultation Obligations with Canada's Indigenous Peoples

Following INFC's review of the information provided to date, INFC has concluded that there is an obligation to consult with Canada's Indigenous Peoples.

INFC's intent is to work with project proponents to engage and consult with Indigenous groups that may have a potential interest in the proposed project. At this time, INFC is not aware of any ongoing consultation with Indigenous groups initiated by the Township of West Lincoln. We understand that further discussion will be required with the Township of West Lincoln to better understand what, if any, consultation activities are planned to be undertaken for this Project and to determine if additional



consultation activities and accommodation measures should be included in the consultation process to allow INFC to meet its requirements.

INFC therefore requests that the Township of West Lincoln notify the following Indigenous groups and inform them that INFC will be contributing financial support for this project:

• Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation.

For your reference, INFC has provided the contact information for the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation found in Annex 1, attached to this letter. Furthermore, INFC has provided an example template notification letter to First Nations, found in Annex 2.

INFC will require a summary of communications, including any issues or concerns that were raised by the respective Indigenous group and an indication of how the Township of West Lincoln has addressed or proposes to address those issues or concerns. For reference, an example of a concerns tracking chart template and communications log template has been provided as Annexes 3 and 4, respectively.

Note: All Annexes were provided as attachments in the original email correspondence from INFC dated April 30, 2020.

Once consultation has started, INFC kindly requests the Township of West Lincoln provide an update on the status of the project and consultation process to INFC. The update provided should focus on the following information:

- Project schedule, including a confirmation of when site preparation works and construction of the Project are expected to start;
- A summary of any consultation activities conducted or planned by the Township of West Lincoln as part of the Project, including any issues or concerns expressed by the Indigenous groups consulted;
- Any accommodation's being negotiated with Indigenous groups; and
- Implementation of any mitigation measures or compensation measures identified during the consultation process.

Once we have received this information, we will confirm when our consultation obligations have been met.

<u>Note</u>: During these unprecedented times regarding the current COVID-19 pandemic, many consultation offices are operating at minimal capacity or have even closed, which will likely result in extended timelines with respect to the whole engagement process. INFC asks that in the notification letter being sent to Indigenous communities, that you avoid using a deadline for a response during this time, and instead offer to work with Indigenous groups to come to a mutually agreed upon timeline and approach to receiving feedback. INFC is asking that the Township of West Lincoln remain patient during this time and note that a no response from the Indigenous community does not necessarily equate to no concerns raised and INFC will work with the Township of West Lincoln as required to better understand the situation. Additionally, INFC is happy to work with the Township of West Lincoln on developing innovative measures to ensure that our requirements are met and encourages the Township of West Lincoln to reach out if this approach is of interest.

We would like to take this opportunity to remind you that the Project may not proceed with site preparation works and construction until INFC can confirm that INFC's obligation to consult with Canada's Indigenous Peoples, have been met.

Should the Township of West Lincoln consider future changes to the nature, scope, design, location or start and completion date of the Reconstruction of St. Ann's Road Project that differ from that which has been provided to date, it is the responsibility of the Township of West Lincoln to immediately notify INFC. The department may then reassess the Project in accordance with the requirements under the IAA and determine whether an obligation to notify or consult with Canada's Indigenous Peoples arises.

As noted above, the federal Minister of Rural Economic Development approved this Project on April 20, 2020. This approval was formalized through a letter from the Minister to their Ontario counterpart per the administrative arrangements for the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program. In this regard, the Township of West Lincoln should confirm the Project approval with the Ontario Ministry of Infrastructure if it has not already been informed.

Thank you for sending us notification regarding (St. Ann's Road Reconstruction). In our preliminary assessment, we have confirmed that Hydro One has existing high voltage Transmission facilities within your study area. At this time we do not have sufficient information to comment on the potential resulting impacts that your project may have on our infrastructure. As such, we must stay informed as more information becomes available so that we can advise if any of the alternative solutions present actual conflicts with our assets, and if so; what resulting measures and costs could be incurred by the proponent. Note that this response does not constitute approval for your plans and is being sent to you as a courtesy to inform you that we must continue to be consulted on your project.

In addition to the existing infrastructure mentioned above, the applicable transmission corridor may have provisions for future lines or already contain secondary land uses (e.g., pipelines, watermains, parking). Please take this into consideration in your planning.

Also, we would like to bring to your attention that should (St. Ann's Road Reconstruction) result in a Hydro One station expansion or transmission line replacement and/or relocation, an Environmental Assessment (EA) will be required as described under the Class Environmental Assessment for Minor Transmission Facilities (Hydro One, 2016). This EA process would require a minimum of 6 months for a Class EA Screening Process (or up to 18 months if a Full Class EA were to be required) to be completed. Associated costs will be allocated and recovered from proponents in accordance with the Transmission System Code. If triggered, Hydro One will rely on studies completed as part of the EA you are current undertaking.

Consulting with Hydro One on such matters during your project's EA process is critical to avoiding conflicts where possible or, where not possible, to streamlining processes (e.g., ensuring study coverage of expansion/relocation areas within the current EA). Once in receipt of more specific project information regarding the potential for conflicts (e.g., siting, routing), Hydro One will be in a better position to communicate objections or not objections to alternatives proposed.

If possible at this stage, please formally confirm that Hydro One infrastructure and associated rights-of-way will be completely avoided, or if not possible, allocate appropriate lead-time in your project schedule to collaboratively work through potential conflicts with Hydro One, which ultimately could result in timelines identified above.

In planning, note that developments should not reduce line clearances or limit access to our infrastructure at any time. Any construction activities must maintain the electrical clearance from the transmission line conductors as specified in the Ontario Health and Safety Act for the respective line voltage.

Be advised that any changes to lot grading or drainage within, or in proximity to Hydro One transmission corridor lands must be controlled and directed away from the transmission corridor.





This letter is in response to the Notice of Completion provided for the Project File Report (Report) for the above noted Class Environmental Assessment (EA) project. Our understanding is that to improve the quality, and life cycle of the roadway and bridge, the Township of West Lincoln (the proponent) has determined that the preferred alternative is to reconstruct the road, improve active transportation facilities, and enhance drainage facilities, which will also address the deteriorating bridge over Twenty Mile Creek. The Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (ministry) provides the following comments for your consideration.

Via E-mail Only

Planning and Policy

 A discussion of the provincial planning and policy context, particularly of the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS), 2020, is missing from the Report. As noted in Section C.1.1.1 of the Municipal Class EA document (<u>https://municipalclassea.ca/manual/page45.html</u>), the PPS is a key consideration for identifying land-use planning objectives and evaluating alternative solutions in Phases 2 of the Class EA process. The ministry notes that the Township of West Lincoln is expected to be kept up-to-date with the PPS in order to protect provincial interests, as per section 4.6 of the PPS, 2020 (<u>www.ontario.ca/page/provincial-policy-statement-2020</u>). Regardless, the ministry notes that policies of the PPS continue to apply even after adoption and approval of an official plan.

Climate Change

- 2) Climate change considerations have not been documented in the Project File Report. The document "Considering Climate Change in the Environmental Assessment Process" (Guide) (<u>http://www.ontario.ca/page/considering-climate-change-environmental-assessment-process</u>) is now a part of the EA program's Guides and Codes of Practice. The Guide sets out the ministry's expectation for considering climate change in the preparation, execution and documentation of environmental assessment studies and processes. The guide provides examples, approaches, resources, and references to assist proponents with consideration of climate change in EA. The proponent should review this Guide in detail. The ministry expects proponents of Class EA projects to:
 - a. Consider the project's expected production of greenhouse gas emissions and impacts on carbon sinks (climate change mitigation), as well as resilience or vulnerability of the undertaking to changing climatic conditions (climate change adaptation).
 - b. Include a discrete section in the Report detailing how climate change was considered in the EA.

How climate change is considered can be qualitative or quantitative in nature and should be scaled to the project's level of environmental effect. In all instances, both a project's impacts on climate change (mitigation) and impacts of climate change on a project (adaptation) should be considered.

Excess Materials and Waste

3) All waste generated during construction must be disposed of in accordance with ministry requirements.

Air Quality and Odour

4) If there are sensitive receptors in the surrounding area of this project, a quantitative air quality/odour impact assessment will be useful to evaluate alternatives, determine impacts and identify appropriate mitigation measures. The scope of the assessment can be determined based on the potential effects of the proposed alternatives, and typically includes source and receptor characterization and a quantification of local air quality impacts on the sensitive receptors and the environment in the study area. The assessment

will compare to all applicable standards or guidelines for all contaminants of concern. Please contact this office for further consultation on the level of Air Quality Impact Assessment required for this project if not already advised.

- 5) If a quantitative Air Quality Impact Assessment is not required for the project, the MECP expects that the report contain a qualitative assessment which includes:
 - a. A discussion of local air quality including existing activities/sources that significantly impact local air quality and how the project may impact existing conditions;
 - b. A discussion of the nearby sensitive receptors and the project's potential air quality impacts on present and future sensitive receptors;
 - c. A discussion of local air quality impacts that could arise from this project during both construction and operation; and
 - d. A discussion of potential mitigation measures.

Soil, Sediment and Brownfields

6) Please note that any on-site and excess soil management shall be undertaken in accordance with the Ontario Regulation 406/19 and associated guidance.

Source Water Protection

- 7) In October 2015 the Municipal Engineers Association Parent Class EA document was amended to include reference to the Clean Water Act in Section A.2.10.6 (accessible online at <u>https://municipalclassea.ca/manual/page19.html</u>), which indicates that proponents of a Class EA project must identify early in their process whether a project is or could potentially be occurring within a vulnerable area.
- 8) The ministry recommends that the proponent include a section on source water protection in the main body of Report in order to clearly document how the proximity of the project to any delineated vulnerable areas, such as highly vulnerable aquifers and significant groundwater recharge areas, was considered and assessed through the Class EA process.
- 9) In order to determine if this project is occurring within a vulnerable area, proponents can use this mapping tool: http://www.applications.ene.gov.on.ca/swp/en/index.php. Note that various layers (including WHPAs, WHPA-Q1 and WHPA-Q2, IPZs, HVAs, SGRAs, EBAs, ICAs) can be turned on through the "Map Legend" bar on the left. Thank you for providing the Ministry of Citizenship and Multiculturalism (MCM) with the Notice of Completion for the above-referenced project.

MCM's interest in this project relates to its mandate of conserving Ontario's cultural heritage, which includes:

- archaeological resources, including land and marine);
- built heritage resources, including bridges and monuments; and
- cultural heritage landscapes.

Under the EA process, the proponent is required to determine a project's potential impact on known (previously recognized) and potential cultural heritage resources.

We have reviewed the Project File Report (PFR) dated June 2023, prepared by Kerry T. Howe Engineering, and offer the following comments.

Project Summary

The purpose of this study is to evaluate and recommend transportation improvements along St. Ann's Road between Regional Road 20 and Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road), along with

intersection improvements, drainage improvements, bridge rehabilitation and railway crossing improvements.

Comments

The PFR makes no mention of potential impacts to built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes, either in the inventory of existing conditions or the description of impacts associated with the preferred alternative. Normally, MCM's <u>Criteria for Evaluating Potential for Built Heritage</u> <u>Resources and Cultural Heritage Landscapes</u> checklist would be completed to determine whether there is a need for technical studies to identify and address such potential impacts. Without this checklist having been completed and referenced in this PFR, it is unclear how built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes were screened out of consideration.

Section 7 should include a mitigation commitment for the possibility of archaeological resources being unexpectedly encountered during construction, in spite of the completion of archaeological assessment. Such a commitment could be based on the language of paragraphs 3 and 4 of Section 6 of the Stage 2 Archaeological Assessment Report provided in Appendix 4.

Please note that the Stage 2 Archaeological Assessment Report provided in Appendix 4 is currently under technical review. Its results should be considered preliminary, and ground-disturbing activities should not commence, until the report has been entered into the Ontario Public Register of Archaeological Reports.

MCM's interest in this Environmental Assessment (EA) project relates to its mandate of conserving Ontario's cultural heritage.

Project Summary

The purpose of this study is to identify a preferred design for the reconstruction of St. Ann's Road between Regional Road 20 and Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road) in the Township of West Lincoln. St. Ann's Road is a two-lane local roadway with gravel shoulders and a sidewalk in the western boulevard between Regional Road 69 and Sixteen Road. Improvements to St. Ann's Road undertaken during the reconstruction may include intersection improvements, drainage improvements, bridge rehabilitation, and railway crossing improvements.

Comments

MCM finds that due diligence has been undertaken in preparing this (amended) Environmental Study Report (ESR) by:

- undertaking a Stage 1 archaeological assessment (AA) (under Project Information Form (PIF) number P348-0117-2021) and Stage 2 AA (under PIF number P362-0334-2022). Both reports have been entered into the Ontario Public Register of Archaeological Reports. The Stage 2 AA report concluded that no further archaeological assessment is required. The Stage 1 AA is included as Appendix 3 of the ESR, and the Stage 2 AA is included as Appendix 4 of the ESR.
- undertaking a Cultural Heritage Report: Existing Conditions and Preliminary Impact Assessment (CHR), included as Appendix 15 of the ESR, which identified 7 (seven) known or potential built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes. comprising six built heritage resources and one cultural heritage landscape within the study area. The CHR recommends monitoring of vibration impacts for all seven identified resources.
- describing the existing conditions, listing the potential impacts and their effects on potential cultural heritage resources and providing recommendations to mitigate any negative impacts in the amended ESR.

We have reviewed the above-referenced CHR and find that the report is overall consistent with the requirements, guidance and standards of the MCEA and with best practice guidance prepared by MCM.

As a point of clarity, cultural heritage resources include both archaeological resources, and built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes. It would be helpful to revise the title of Section 4.5 of the ESR to '*Built Heritage Resources and Cultural Heritage Landscapes*' as archaeological resources are addressed in the previous section. The *Cultural Heritage* subheading in Section 7.0 should also be revised in the same manner.

Good Morning,

I've reviewed the MECP comment regarding Source Water Protection and I can advise that there is no Source Protection Plan policies applicable in this area. The Source Protection Plan only applies to municipal drinking water sources, which in Niagara are identified around water treatment plants. There are no intake protection zones (IPZs) in this area. The NPCA does not have any policies for vulnerable aquifers or significant ground water recharge areas.

With respect to the NPCA's permitting requirements under Section 28 of the Conservation Authorities Act, a Permit will be required from the NPCA for work within NPCA regulated areas will be required. Due to the nature of the work proposed, we anticipate that standard mitigation measures will be required (e.g. proper sediment and erosion control). The permit application form can be found here: <u>PERMIT_APPLICATION_PACKAGE_VF2.0_(CSD_Appendix_D)_.pdf (npca.ca)</u>. The Permit fee for this application is \$678.00 and we will require the detailed design drawings to be submitted as part of the application. From the report the preferred bridge works were as follows

The preferred alternative is Option 1 above consisting of a minor rehabilitation with a full reconstruction in 20 years. This option would include the following:

- Remove the existing asphalt on the approaches and over the bridge deck,
- Remove bridge deck waterproofing,
- Remove 60mm from the top of the concrete bridge deck,
- Remove deteriorated and/or delaminated concrete on top of the sidewalk,
- Concrete patch repair the top of the sidewalk,
- Concrete patch repair abutments, wingwalls, and soffit,
- Replace deck drains,
- Pour 60mm thick concrete bridge deck overlay,
- Waterproof and pave the bridge deck,
- Grade and place riprap at all four corners,
- Install new steel beam guiderail at all four corners and update structure connections as per OPSD

All work over the creek will require approval from the Niagara Peninsula Conservation Authority (NPCA), and the Ministry of Natural Resources and forestry (MNRF).

The bridge rehabilitation could be done in as little as 2 months with a full closure of the bridge. If the bridge must remain open during rehabilitation, the rehabilitation will have to be staged and will take significantly more time and at a higher cost. As St. Ann's is a short road with easy access to RR69, RR20 and Sixteen Road, the bridge could be closed for a period of 2 months with little disruption to the local residents.

From the report the proposed road works are as follows

Design Option 2: 7.0m wide road with curb and gutter (Preferred Option)

Reconstruct the road with two standard 3.5m wide lanes and add curb and gutter on both sides of the road from Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road) to Sixteen Road. Sidewalk will be constructed within the within the boulevard in the same location as the existing. A new storm sewer will be constructed to collect water from the gutters and behind the curb where ponding is a concern.

The section from Sixteen Road to Regional Road 20 would remain rural with gravel shoulders and roadside ditches.

The bridge will have minor restorations as described in Section 4.7 above, and any sightline interference at the railway crossing from vegetation will be removed.

This design option would have the least amount of impact on property lines, utilities and adjacent properties as it is the narrowest option. The sidewalk would remain in the same location, but the addition of a barrier curb would provide added safety for pedestrians. It is estimated that this design option would conflict with 8 utility poles. Based on the proposed location, the curb and subdrain installation could be in conflict with approximately 430m of gas main. Test pits completed in this section and the HP 150mm diameter gas main varied between 1.0 and 1.2 metres with similar depths on the 50 mm service main. The test pit information is included on the EA drawings. The subdrain under the curb should not conflict with the gas main and it should be possible to install the curb and subdrain without requiring gas relocations. This design would also require replacement and extension of the existing storm sewer. Catchbasins may be required to collect surface drainage from the road and also behind the curb at low spots that cannot drain over the boulevard. As this design is the narrowest, it would also have the least impact on gardens and trees.

This design would provide no added benefit for cyclists. Cyclists would be forced to share the road with motorists. Although the road would be the same approximate width as the existing platform, the addition of curb and gutter and a narrower feeling road through line painting would make motorists feel more constrained and therefore may decrease traffic speeds.

The addition of a curb and gutter will pose a grading challenge. If the road surface is kept at approximately the same elevation as the existing road, the boulevards will be raised by approximately 150mm. This could add to the drainage concerns on private property. This, however, could be mitigated by placing catchbasins behind the curb to collect water from the low spots. Regardless, the curb and gutter system would contain any road drainage which would significantly reduce the runoff that currently drains to private property.

It is not recommended that the road be further dropped to allow the boulevards to drain over the curbs and onto the road. This would reduce cover over the gas main resulting in significant costs for relocation. As one of the gas mains is an extra high pressure main, all attempts to avoid relocation should be made. There is also minimal cover available for the storm sewer. As the boreholes showed shallow bedrock in at BH's 2,3 and 4, there is already minimal room for a storm sewer without the having to hoe ram the bedrock. Fortunately, as the road has a significant grade at this location, it is possible to stop the storm sewer south of this conflict location.



St. Ann's Road Reconstruction Schedule B Municipal Class EA Study and Preliminary Design

Study Description

The Township of West Lincoln (the Township) has initiated a Schedule 'B' Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) to address the structure rehabilitation of St. Ann's Road from Regional Road 20 to Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Rd). St. Ann's Road presently functions as a two-lane semi-rural local road serving north and south traffic. It also crosses the CP Rail main line track and Bridge 46 over the North Creek watercourse. The Study will look at the following improvements:

- Reconstruction of St. Ann's Road from Regional Road 20 to Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road) (approximately 1.45 km)
- Possible storm sewer replacement between Sixteen Road and Regional Road 69
- Intersection and drainage improvements
- Rehabilitation of Bridge 46 over the North Creek watercourse
- CP Rail main line crossing improvements
- Culvert replacement



The Township has retained Wood Environment & Infrastructure Solutions (Wood) to undertake part of the study, specifically the activities relating to geotechnical investigation, environmental studies, archaeology studies, and Indigenous Nation engagement. The firm Kerry T. Howe shall be preparing the preliminary design and hosting the public information sessions for this EA process.

Municipal Class Environmental Assessment

A Municipal Class EA is a decision-making and planning process that identifies the potential effects of projects, such as road improvements, so that they can be managed prior to implementation. The purpose of this Class EA is to:

- Identify and evaluate potential improvement options for this road;
- Through a rigorous assessment, recommend the most feasible infrastructure improvement solution (i.e., do nothing, sidewalk improvements, drainage

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improvements, lighting improvements, and on street parking) and associated preferred design;

 Identify the potential effects associated with the recommended solution and associated preferred design and identify practical measures to avoid or mitigate potential negative effects.

The first step in the Class EA Study process is to develop an understanding of the current conditions in the study area. Once baseline conditions are determined, potential alternatives to address the road reconstruction works will be developed.

The Class EA planning process helps identify the potential effects of proposed projects. Each proposed alternative is assessed against baseline conditions to determine the potential effects, and where necessary, identify mitigation measures to minimize or avoid those impacts. From these alternatives, the most feasible alternative is identified.

A key component of this study is to consult with regulatory agencies, conservation authorities, stakeholders and Indigenous Nations.

Baseline Studies

West Lincol

Baseline studies are prepared to describe the current biological, human and physical environment conditions. The following investigations will be completed as part of this Study:

- Natural Environment Assessment
- Water Resources (Including Stormwater) Assessment
- Geotechnical Investigation
- Stage 1 Archaeological Assessment
- Structural Assessment of the Bridge

Once the draft reports are completed, the draft document(s) shall be provided to Indigenous Nations for review and comment, prior to finalization and in advance of the public review process. For draft reports, a review period of 30 days will be provided for Nation feedback.

Potential Study Related Effects

Potential Study effects will be identified through an evaluation of the alternatives. Once the preferred design is identified, potential effects will be identified, and mitigation measures will be proposed to avoid/mitigate potential impacts. This may include effects on:

- Heritage properties and cultural heritage landscapes.
- Environmental features including land-based and water-based environments.

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Schedule and Next Steps

- Drilling tentatively planned for early November 2021
- Natural Environmental Assessment date to be determined.
- Public Information Centre #1: tentatively planned for winter 2022.
- Public information Centre #2: tentatively planned for spring 2022.
- Project File Report (final report): tentatively planned for summer 2022. This will include a minimum 30-day review period. The Township will provide an opportunity for review the draft final report to Indigenous Nations prior to the public review period.





Thanks for the call yesterday. As we discussed, here is a brief summary of the fieldwork completed:

Palmer visited the Study Area (St. Ann's Road from Regional Road 20 to Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road)) on September 24, 2021. This was a roadside survey as we couldn't get access to private properties and included:

- a botanical survey + Ecological Land Classification (ELC)
- Species at Risk habitat assessment
- Incidental wildlife observations
- Wildlife habitat
- Aquatic assessments for Twenty Mile Creek and Sixteen Mile Creek

The main natural feature on this site is the Twenty Mile Creek which is associated with a Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW) (Lower Twenty Mile Creek PSW). No rare or Species at Risk flora or fauna were observed within the Study Area.

Next Steps: The Natural Environmental Assessment Report is still in draft form, but we have a draft figure that depicts the existing environmental conditions of the site. Once we have further design details, we can continue working on the impact assessment. The report can be provided to MCFN for review and feedback once completed.

Confirmation of Receipt

I am writing on behalf of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation ("MCFN") to acknowledge that we have received your above named communication, dated October 7,2021

Outline of MCFN Rights and Territory

In 1792, the Crown and MCFN entered into Between the Lakes, No. 3 (1792) regarding the lands in which your project is situated.

The Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation are the descendants of the "River Credit" Mississaugas. The undisputed Territory of the MCFN is defined as a Territory commencing at Long Point on Lake Erie thence eastward along the shore of the Lake to the Niagara River. Then down the River to Lake Ontario, northward along the shore of the Lake to the River Rouge east of Toronto then up that river to the dividing ridges to the head waters of the River Thames then southward to Long Point, the place of the beginning. Our Territory encompasses the lands and waters that were used and occupied by our Ancestors. Territories are usually large tracts of land that reflect the breadth required for seasonal activities and habitation and changes in those movement patterns through time. Through Treaties with the Crown, MCFN agreed to share our Territory with newcomers. However, not all of MCFN's Territory has been dealt with through a Treaty.

With the exception of a small part of the Credit River, our Treaties with the Crown did not deal with the water parts of our Territory. We have not agreed to share any part of our waters with settlers. We formally gave notice to the Crown of this claim in 2016. We note that any lands that have been artificially created on our waters have also not been dealt with by any Treaty.

Like our ancestors before us, we continue to use the lands, waters, and watershed ecosystems within our Territory for a variety of livelihood, harvesting, ceremonial and spiritual purposes. We have always exercised governance functions and stewardship in order to protect our Territory, conserve the fish and wildlife that depend upon it, and ensure its ongoing ability to sustain our people. We assert that our Aboriginal and treaty rights fundamentally entitle us to continue to act as stewards of our Territory, to be involved in decisions that affect it, and to participate in the ongoing, responsible management of the resources it provides.

Duty to Consult and Accommodate

As you will know, the Crown has a constitutional duty to consult and accommodate MCFN in respect of any decisions that might affect its asserted or proven Aboriginal and/or Treaty Rights. We expect that, consistent with the Crown's constitutional duty, no approval should be issued to this project until MCFN has been sufficiently consulted and accommodated. Nothing in this letter shall be construed as to affect our Aboriginal and/or Treaty Rights and hence shall not limit any consultation and accommodation owed to MCFN by the Crown or any proponent, as recognized by section 35 of the Constitution Act, 1982.

MCFN has the right to free and informed consent prior to the approval of any project or any planning decision adversely impacting its Territory and to benefit economically from resource development within its Territory.

MCFN has formed the Department of Consultation and Accommodation ("DOCA") to represent its interests in consultation and accommodation matters. It is DOCA's mandate to ensure that we are directly involved in all planning and development that impacts the integrity of our Territory. In this regard, DOCA will assess and help alleviate impacts on our rights, land claims, and ways of life by building relationships with governments and private sector proponents. We share a mutual interest in ensuring that projects in the Territory are planned, reviewed, and developed in a manner which ensures healthy communities, ecological protection, and sustainable development for present and future generations in the Territory.

MCFN is not opposed to development, but MCFN must to be involved in development decision making. MCFN has a deep connection to its Territory and we have a stewardship responsibility for our land. By engaging with us, a project proponent can learn our perspective on how to care for this land and we can work together to shape the project to mitigate damaging effects to our land and perhaps even work to improve our environment. MCFN is the only party who shall determine whether there are impacts to our Aboriginal and treaty rights.

One of the ways we require proponents to engage with us is in providing transparency during the environmental survey and archaeological assessment process. The best way to accomplish this is by having Field Liaison Representatives ("FLRs") on location while fieldwork is occurring, who can ensure that the Nation's special interests and concerns are respected and considered during fieldwork. The cultural and natural resources in question are part of MCFN's territory and heritage and it is our responsibility to ensure their protection, on behalf of the Nation. MCFN's stewardship of its territory extends through the life of any development project and beyond.

Thank you for the speedy response and update.

I would recommend occasional updates be submitted (ex. quarterly) that way, if there is anything of particular interest or concern on our end, we are able to flag as things are ongoing rather than at the end when you think consultation has been wrapped up, however, this approach is not mandatory. Since funding eligibility can be impacted if construction begins without INFC determining that requirements have been met, we wanted assurance that consultation has been initiated (which you have confirmed it has).

I will save this email to file as confirmation of consultation underway. I would recommend sending what you have to date so that we can have a sense of where things are at with consultation. It will also help give us some context should you have any questions that arise regarding the consultation process. At the very least, please send a copy of the

notification letter sent so that we can save it to file and have supporting documentation of the consultation underway.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

WSP Canada Inc. (WSP) was retained by Kerry T. Howe Engineering Ltd. on behalf of the Township of West Lincoln (the Client) to complete a Cultural Heritage Report: Existing Conditions and Preliminary Impact Assessment (Cultural Heritage Report) to support St. Ann's Road Reconstruction Municipal Class Environmental Assessment Study (the Project) located in the Township of West Lincoln, Region of Niagara, Ontario. The Study Area is comprised of St. Ann's Road between Highway 20 and Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road).

The project will include intersection improvements, drainage improvements, bridge rehabilitation, railway crossing improvements, road reconstruction and other road/right-of-way features to St. Ann's Road, limited to the public Right-of-Way.

Located in the community of Saint Anns, the Study Area was historically described as part of Lots 21 and 22, Concession 6, and Lots 21 and 22 Concession 5, former Township of Gainsborough, Lincoln County. The Study Area generally follows St. Ann's Road from Highway 20 in the south and Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road) in the north.

The purpose of this Cultural Heritage Report is to establish the historical context of the Study Area, identify known and potential heritage properties through information gathering and fieldwork, and develop an inventory of built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes. Based on the current understanding of the Study Area, a preliminary impact assessment and recommended mitigation measures were prepared.

The results of background research, information gathering, and a field review determined that there are seven (7) potential heritage properties located within the Study Area.

Based on the above, WSP makes the following recommendations:

- 1 Avoidance of potential built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes is recommended from a cultural heritage perspective. The proposed work should be planned in a manner that avoids direct and indirect impact to identified built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes. Further, the locations of CHR 1- CHR 7 should be indicated on project mapping so that project personnel are aware of the presence of these potential built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes.
- 2 Vibration impacts are anticipated for all seven (7) heritage resources: CHR 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7. To mitigate impacts related to potential vibration impacts resulting from construction activities, WSP recommends that a qualified vibration specialist is consulted to develop an appropriate vibration monitoring program to avoid or reduce impacts to the identified historical structures.
- 3 Should future work require expansion of the St. Ann's Road Reconstruction Study Area, then a qualified heritage consultant should be contacted to confirm the impacts of the proposed work on the identified built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes.
- 4 This report should be submitted to the MCM for information purposes.

1 INTRODUCTION

WSP Canada Inc. (WSP) was retained by Kerry T. Howe Engineering Ltd. on behalf of the Township of West Lincoln (the Client) to complete a Cultural Heritage Report: Existing Conditions and Preliminary Impact Assessment (Cultural Heritage Report) to support St. Ann's Road Reconstruction Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (the Project) located in the Township of West Lincoln, Region of Niagara, Ontario. The project was triggered by the *Environmental Assessment Act* and involves the widening of St. Ann's Road from Highway 20 to Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road).

Located in the community of Saint Anns, the Study Area was historically described as part of Lots 21 and 22, Concession 6, and Lots 21 and 22 Concession 5, former Township of Gainsborough, Lincoln County. The Study Area generally follows St. Ann's Road from Highway 20 in the south and Regional Road 69 in the north. For the purposes of this report, the Cultural Heritage Study Area (Study Area) is defined as the project footprint plus adjacent properties (Figure 1).


The overall objective of the Project is to widen St. Ann's Road. The project works are limited to the public Right-of-Way. The project will include an urban and semi-urban cross section from Regional Road 69, southerly to the hamlet boundary (south of Sixteen Road); and rural cross section for the remainder to Regional Road 20. This project will include intersection improvements, drainage improvements, bridge rehabilitation, railway crossing improvements, road reconstruction and other road/right-of-way features.

The purpose of this Cultural Heritage Report is to establish the historical context of the Study Area, identify known and potential heritage properties through information gathering and fieldwork, and develop an inventory of built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes. Based on the current understanding of the Study Area, a preliminary impact assessment and recommended mitigation measures were prepared.

1.1 SCOPE


The tasks completed to prepare this Cultural Heritage Report included:


- Background research, including consultation of primary and secondary sources and review historical maps/aerial imagery to gain an understanding of the historical evolution of the Study Area;
- Online data collection and submission of agency information requests to the Township of West Lincoln, Ontario Heritage Trust, and the Ministry of Citizenship and Multiculturalism (MCM) to determine the presence of known built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes within the Study Area;
- Conducting a field investigation to document the Study Area's existing conditions, confirm the presence of
 protected heritage properties, and identify potential built heritage resources and/or cultural heritage
 landscapes;
- Creating an inventory of built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes with Statement of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest (SCHVI) and list of heritage attributes for protected properties and highlevel description and preliminary list of heritage attributes for potential heritage properties; and
- Assess the potential impacts from the proposed works to identified built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes and recommend conservation and mitigation measures where impacts are anticipated.



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
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2 METHODOLOGY

2.1 REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS

The requirements to consider cultural heritage under the Environmental Assessment process are found in the *Provincial Policy Statement* (PPS) (Government of Ontario 2020) and the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. O.18 (Government of Ontario 1990).

2.1.1 PROVINCIAL POLICY STATEMENT

The PPS provides policy direction on matters of provincial interest related to land use planning and development (Government of Ontario 2020:1). Under the PPS, the conservation of cultural heritage is identified as a matter of provincial interest. Section 2.6 of the PPS gives direction on the consideration of cultural heritage and archaeology (Government of Ontario 2020:31). Specifically, the following direction is given regarding built heritage resources, cultural heritage landscapes, and protected heritage properties:

2.6.1 Significant built heritage resources and significant cultural heritage landscapes shall be conserved

2.6.3 Planning authorities shall not permit development and site alteration on adjacent lands to protected heritage property except where the proposed development and site alteration has been evaluated and it has been demonstrated that the heritage attributes of the protected heritage property will be conserved.

2.6.5 Planning authorities shall engage with Indigenous communities and consider their interests when identifying, protecting and managing cultural heritage and archaeological resources.

(Government of Ontario 2020)

2.1.2 ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT ACT

The *Environmental Assessment Act (EAA)* sets out planning and decision-making processes so that potential environmental effects are identified before a project begins (Government of Ontario 1990). The *EAA* applies to provincial ministries and agencies, municipalities, and public and private bodies. Under the *EAA*, there are two types of assessments: Individual EAs and Streamlined EAs. Individual EAs are large-scale, complex projects with the potential for significant environmental effects. Streamlined EAs are routine projects that have predictable and manageable environmental effects. There are different types of Streamlined EA processes, depending on project type. Municipal infrastructure planning projects fall under the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (MCEA) which are classified in terms of Schedules, depending on the magnitude of effects. The Schedule A, B and C Municipal Class EAs are defined within the MCEA Manual as follows:

Schedule A: These projects generally apply to normal, or emergency operational/maintenance procedures and the resulting effects are usually minimal and, therefore, these projects are pre-approved.

Schedule A+: These projects, similarly to the Schedule 'A', are pre-approved and typically involved minimal effects/impacts. Unlike the Schedule 'A' these projects require the public to be notified prior to the planned work.

Schedule B: These projects generally include improvements and minor expansions to existing facilities and there is a potential for some adverse environmental impacts.

Schedule C: These projects generally include the construction of new facilities and/or major expansions to existing facilities. As a result, these projects have the potential for significant environmental effects.

(MCEA 2015)

Section A.3.7 of the MCEA Manual identifies Indigenous Nations as an important group for municipal consultation. It directs the municipal proponents to contact the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks for direction on consultation with the Indigenous Nations.

The requirement to consider cultural heritage in Class EAs is discussed in the MCEA Manual (2015) where the cultural environment is identified as one of the key considerations in the MCEA process (MCEA 2015: B.1.1). Under Section B of the MCEA Manual, the cultural environment includes archaeological resources, areas of archaeological potential, built heritage resources, and cultural heritage landscapes (MCEA 2015: B.1.1[4]). Further, the MCEA Manual (2015: B1.1[4]) gives the following direction regarding the cultural environment:

Significant cultural heritage and archaeological resources features should be avoided where possible. Where they cannot be avoided, then effects should be minimized where possible, and every effort made to mitigate adverse impacts, in accordance with provincial and municipal policies and procedures. Cultural heritage features should be identified early in the process in order to determine significant features and potential impacts.

2.1.3 ONTARIO HERITAGE ACT

The *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c.018, provides a framework for the protection of cultural heritage resources in the Province. It gives municipalities and the provincial government powers to protect heritage properties and archaeological sites. The *Ontario Heritage Act* includes two regulations for determining CHVI: Ontario Regulation (O. Reg.) 9/06 and O. Reg. 10/06. O. Reg. 9/06 (as amended by O. Reg. 569/22) provides criteria to determine the CHVI of a property at a local level while O. Reg. 10/06 provides criteria to determine if a property has CHVI of provincial significance (Government of Ontario 2023).

2.1.4 TOWNSHIP OF WEST LINCOLN OFFICIAL PLAN

Development in the Township of West Lincoln is guided by the Township of West Lincoln Official Plan (West Lincoln 2021). Cultural heritage policies within the Township's Official Plan are contained within Section 8. Heritage Conservation. Policies relevant to this Cultural Heritage Report include:

8.1 Background

Cultural heritage resources include, but are not necessarily restricted to archaeological sites, buildings and structural remains of historical, architectural and contextual value, and human-made rural, village and urban districts or landscapes of historic and scenic interest.

8.2 Objectives

a) To protect, preserve and encourage the restoration of the original architectural detail wherever feasible on all buildings designated as having architectural and historical merit within the Township West Lincoln.

- b) To prevent the demolition, destruction or inappropriate alteration or use of heritage resources.
- c) To support and encourage the voluntary designation of historic buildings and structures.
- d) To consider the interests of Aboriginal communities.

8.3 Policies

8.3.1 Council will consult with the Township of West Lincoln Heritage Committee in matters relating to the conservation of cultural heritage resources within the Township boundaries. The Heritage Committee may identify and/or inventory buildings of architectural or historical significance and advise Council on those considered worthy of designation under the Ontario Heritage Act. Individual properties may be considered for designation pursuant to the Ontario Heritage Act.

8.3.2 In reviewing proposals for the addition to, demolition or removal of designated buildings and structures or the alteration of existing buildings, the Township will be guided by the following general principles:

a) Heritage buildings, associated landscape features and archaeological sites including their surroundings should be protected from any adverse effects of change;

b) Original building fabric and architectural features such as doors, windows, mouldings, verge boards, walling materials and roofs should be retained and repaired rather than replaced wherever possible;

c) New additions and features should generally be no higher than the existing building and wherever possible be placed to the rear of the building or set back substantially from the principle façade.

(West Lincoln 2021: 97-98)

2.2 GUIDANCE DOCUMENTS

The MCM is responsible for the administration of the *Ontario Heritage Act* and has developed checklists, information bulletins, standards and guidelines, and policies to support the conservation of Ontario's cultural heritage resources, including built heritage resources, cultural heritage landscapes, and archaeological sites. For cultural heritage, the *Criteria for Evaluating Potential for Built Heritage Resources and Cultural Heritage Landscapes: A Checklist for the Non-Specialist* (the Checklist) is utilized to determine if project areas/properties have either known or potential CHVI. The Checklist includes screening criteria for local or Indigenous knowledge (MCM 2016).

The MCM *Ontario Heritage Tool Kit* provides guidance and information on the heritage conservation process in Ontario (MCM 2006a). MCM *InfoSheet#5: Heritage Impact Assessment and Conservation Plans* of the Ontario Heritage Tool Kit was used to guide the general preparation of this report (MCM 2006b).

2.3 BACKGROUND RESEARCH

Background research was carried out during the preparation of this Cultural Heritage Report to gain a thorough understanding of the historical context of the Study Area. Primary sources, secondary sources, historical maps, and aerial photographs were consulted, as appropriate, to identify historical themes relevant to the Study Area. Specifically, research regarding the physiography, Indigenous history, survey and settlement, and 19th- and 20th-century land use of the Study Area was completed. A review of historical mapping and aerial photographs was also conducted to identify settlements, structures, and landscape features within, and adjacent to, the Study Area. Historical maps and imagery from 1862, 1876, 1907, 1923, 1934, 1938, 1954, and 2020, as well as recent Google Earth imagery were reviewed to identify changes within, and adjacent to, the Study Area.

The results of the background research are presented in Section 0 of this report.

2.4 INFORMATION GATHERING

Information gathering was carried out to identify known and potential built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes in the Study Area. For this Cultural Heritage Report, the Township of West Lincoln, Ontario Heritage Trust, and the MCM were contacted directly via email and/or phone to determine the presence of listed, designated, or protected heritage properties within, and adjacent to, the Study Area.

The results of the information gathering are presented in Section 4.1 of this report.

2.5 FIELD REVIEW

A field review of the Study Area was completed to identify known and potential built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes. During the field review, the 40-year threshold was used to identify properties with the potential to have CHVI. The 40-year rule is generally accepted by federal and provincial agencies as a preliminary screening measure for CHVI. It should be noted, however, that the 40-year threshold is a guide only and does not imply that all properties of 40 years of age have CHVI. Nor does it exclude properties that are less than 40 years of age and exhibit CHVI. The professional judgement of WSP heritage staff was used during the field review to apply the 40-year rule and identify properties with potential CHVI.

The field review was completed by Claire Forward, Cultural Heritage Specialist at WSP, on Wednesday, October 25, 2023. The results of the field review are presented in Section 0 of this report.

2.6 INVENTORY OF BUILT HERITAGE RESOURCES AND CULTURAL HERITAGE LANDSCAPES

Following the completion of the background research, information gathering, and field review, an inventory of built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes within, and adjacent to, the Study Area was created. The inventory of built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes is presented in Section 4.3 of this report.

2.7 PRELIMINARY IMPACT ASSESSMENT

A preliminary impact assessment (hereafter referred to as "impact assessment") was completed to determine impacts–direct or indirect–to identified built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes by the proposed work. The impact assessment for this CHVI was prepared using the impact examples provided in the MCM *InfoSheet #5: Heritage Impact Assessment and Conservation Plans* (InfoSheet #5) (MCM 2006b). The following impacts to cultural heritage resources were considered:

- Destruction of any, or part of any, significant heritage attributes or features
- Alteration that is not sympathetic, or is incompatible, with the historic fabric and appearance;
- Shadows created that alter the appearance of a heritage attribute or change the viability of a natural feature or plantings, such as a garden;
- Isolation of a heritage attribute from its surrounding environment, context or a significant relationship;
- Direct or indirect obstruction of significant views or vistas within, from, or of built and natural features;
- A change in land use such as rezoning a battlefield from open space to residential use, allowing new
 development or site alteration to fill in the formerly open spaces; and,
- Land disturbances such as a change in grade that alters soils, and drainage patterns that adversely affect and archaeological resource.

In addition, mitigation measures outlined in MCM InfoShee t#5 were used to guide the preparation of considered alternatives, mitigation and conservation methods. These include methods of minimizing or avoiding a negative impact to cultural heritage resources, such as:

- Alternative development approaches;
- Isolating development and site alteration from significant built and natural features and vistas;
- Design guidelines that harmonize mass, setbacks, settings, and materials;
- Limiting height and density;
- Allowing only compatible infill and additions;
- Reversible alterations; and,
- Buffer zones, site plan control, and other planning mechanisms.

The results of the impact assessment and recommended mitigation measures are contained in Section 5.

3 BACKGROUND RESEARCH

3.1 HISTORICAL CONTEXT

3.1.1 INDIGENOUS CONTEXT

The following provides a generalized cultural history of Indigenous people within the region the Study Area is situated. Information is primarily derived from the archaeological record and the interpretations of archaeologists. Technological or temporal divisions have been defined to describe adaptations to changing climates, physiography, subsistence patterns, and geopolitical pressures which do not necessarily provide an accurate reflection of fluid cultural practices spanning thousands of years. Likewise, terms used in this history have been created by archaeologists and do not reflect the names used by Indigenous peoples. The following presents a sequence of Indigenous land-use from earliest human occupation following deglaciation to the recent past based on periods defined by archaeologists as:

- Paleo Period;
- Archaic Period;
- Woodland Period; and
- Post-Contact Period.

Paleo period populations were the first to occupy what is now southern Ontario, moving into the region following the retreat of the Laurentide Ice Sheet approximately 11,000 years before present (BP). The first Paleo period populations to occupy southern Ontario are referred to by archaeologists as Early Paleo (Ellis and Deller 1990).

Early Paleo period groups are identified by their distinctive projectile point characteristics, exhibiting long grooves, or 'flutes', that likely functioned as a hafting mechanism (method of attaching the point to a wooden stick). These Early Paleo group projectile morphological types include Gainey (ca. 10,900 BP), Barnes (ca. 10,700), and Crowfield (ca. 10,500) (Ellis and Deller 1990). By approximately 10,400 BP, Paleo projectile points transitioned to various unfluted varieties such as Holcombe (ca. 10,300 BP), Hi Lo (ca. 10,100 BP), and Unstemmed and Stemmed Lanceolate (ca. 10,400 to 9,500 BP). These point types were utilized by Late Paleo period groups (Ellis and Deller 1990). Both Early and Late Paleo period populations were highly mobile, participating in the hunting of large game animals. Paleo period sites often functioned as small campsites where stone tool production and maintenance occurred (Ellis and Deller 1990).

Climatic warming, which occurred approximately 8,000 BP, was accompanied by the arrival of the deciduous forest in southern Ontario. With this shift in flora came new faunal resources, resulting in a change in cultural adaptations in the region. This change is reflected in new tool-kits and associated subsistence strategies referred to archaeologically as the Archaic period. The Archaic period in southern Ontario is divided into three phases: the Early Archaic (ca. 10,000 to 8,000 BP), the Middle Archaic (ca. 8,000 to 4,500 BP), and the Late Archaic (ca. 4,500 to 2,800 BP) (Ellis et al. 1990).

The Archaic period is differentiated from earlier Paleo populations by a number of traits such as: 1) an increase in tool stone variation and reliance on local tool stone sources, 2) the emergence of notched and stemmed projectile point characteristics, 3) a reduction in extensively flaked tools, 4) the use of native copper, 5) the use of bone tools for hooks, gorges, and harpoons, 6) an increase in extensive trade networks, and 7) the production of ground stone tools. Also noted is an increase in the recovery of large woodworking tools such as chisels, adzes (a tool similar to an axe with an arched blade, used for cutting or shaping large pieces of wood), and axes (Ellis et al. 1990). The Archaic period is also marked by population growth. Archaeological evidence suggests that by the end of the Middle Archaic period (ca. 4,500 BP) populations were steadily increasing in size (Ellis et al. 1990).

Over the course of the Archaic period, populations began to rely on more localized hunting and gathering territories. By the end of the Archaic period, populations were utilizing more seasonal encampments. From spring to fall, settlements would exploit lakeshore/riverine locations where a broad-based subsistence strategy could be employed, while the late fall and winter months would be spent at interior site where deer hunting was

likely a primary focus with some wild edibles also being collected (Ellis et al., 1990: 114). This steady increase in population size and adoption of a more localized seasonal subsistence strategy eventually evolved into what is termed the Woodland period.

The beginning of the Woodland period is identified by archaeologists by the emergence of ceramic technology for the manufacture of pottery. Similar to the Archaic period, the Woodland period is separated into three primary timeframes: the Early Woodland (approximately 2,800 to 2,000 BP), the Middle Woodland (approximately 2,000 to 1,200 BP), and the Late Woodland (approximately 1,200 to 350 BP) (Spence et al., 1990; Fox, 1990).

The Early Woodland period is represented in southern Ontario by two different cultural complexes: the Meadowood Complex (ca. 2,900 to 2,500 BP), and the Middlesex Complex (ca. 2,500 to 2,000 BP). During this period, the life ways of Early Woodland populations differed little from that of the Late Archaic with hunting and gathering representing the primary subsistence strategies. The pottery of this period is characterized by its relatively crude construction and lack of decorations. These early ceramics exhibit cord impressions, likely resulting from the techniques used during manufacture (Spence et al. 1990).

The Middle Woodland period is differentiated from the Early Woodland period by changes in lithic tool characteristics (e.g. projectile points, expedient tools) and the increased elaboration of ceramic vessels (Spence et al. 1990). In southern Ontario, the Middle Woodland is observed in three different cultural complexes: the Point Peninsula Complex to the north and northeast of Lake Ontario, the Couture Complex near Lake St. Clair, and the Saugeen Complex throughout the remainder of southern Ontario. These groups can be identified by their use of either dentate or pseudo scalloped ceramic decorations. It is by the end of the Middle Woodland period that archaeological evidence begins to suggest the early use of maize (corn) horticulture (Warrick 2000).

The adoption and expansion of maize horticulture during the Late Woodland period allowed for an increase in population size, density and complexity among Late Woodland populations. As a result, a shift in subsistence and settlement patterns occurred, with the adoption of a more sedentary village life and reliance on maize horticulture, with beans, squash and tobacco also being grown. Nearing the end of the Late Woodland period (approximately 600 BP) villages reached their maximum size.

During this period, increased warfare resulted in the development of larger villages with extensive palisades. In the Eramosa River area, the shift from Point Peninsula tradition during the Middle Woodland period to the Late Woodland period Iroquoian lifeways is indicated by settlement in larger, more permanent village sites. Later in the Late Woodland period, the pre-contact Neutral tradition is defined by large villages (up to five hectares in size) with large populations and extensive farming of crops. Additional site types, including hamlets, cabins, camps and cemeteries are represented in the Late Woodland period as well (Williamson 2013).

From the Late Woodland to contact with Europeans in the 16th century, southern Ontario was a culturally dynamic area, populated by distinct Nadowek (Iroquoian) and Anishinaabeg (Algonkian) groups (Englebrecht 2003; Trigger 2000; Schmalz 1991). Nadowek life increasingly revolved around growing maize and other crops such as beans, squash, sunflower, and tobacco, while people ancestral to the Anishinaabe following the Western Basin way of life were more mobile, moving with seasonally available resources. However, at the borderlands of the Nadowek and Western Basin were agricultural communities living in small, palisaded villages with a mix of small and large houses, and who were both farming and seasonally mobile.

During the 18th century, the British colonial regime entered into a series of treaties with the Indigenous Nations in Canada. While these treaties were intended as formal legally binding agreements that would set out the rights, responsibilities and relationships between Indigenous Nations and the federal and provincial governments, the government of Ontario acknowledges that Indigenous Nations may have different understandings of the treaties (Government of Ontario 2022, Historica Canada 2021). As French and British encroachment increased from the early 19th century onwards, Indigenous ways of life adapted to the change in complex and varied ways.

The Seven Years' War (1756-1763) was a global war that was fought in Europe, India, America, and at sea (Historica Canada 2006). In North American, Britain and France struggled for dominance with each side supported by Indigenous allies. At the conclusion of the war, Britain became the leading colonial power in North America (Historica Canada 2006). In 1763, the British issue the Royal Proclamation, which stated that land that was not in control of the British belonged to Indigenous Nations and that the Nations would retain their lands unless ceded to the Crown (Historica Canada 2006). The Nations and the British met at Fort Niagara in 1764 where they negotiated a new alliance that was embodied in the Covenant Chain Wampum Belt and the Treaty of Niagara Alliance Medal (Canadian Museum of History 2023). The Royal Proclamation of 1763 and the Niagara Treaty of 1764 are of great significance since the British recognized that Indigenous Nations owned

the land and were an autonomous entity (Canadian Museum of History 2023). This relationship is conveyed on the 1764 Covenant Chain Wampum Belt that depicts two people side by side, as equals (Canadian Museum of History 2023)

The Study Area falls within the boundaries of the subsequent Between the Lakes Treaty (Treaty No. 3), which was signed between the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation and Colonel John Butler on behalf of the British Crown in 1792. The treaty covered the entire Niagara Peninsula west of the previously signed Mississauga Treaty at Niagara (1781) and continued westward into the present-day Regional Municipality of Waterloo and County of Norfolk. This included all of the land between the Niagara Peninsula along the shore of Lake Ontario and the north shore of Lake Erie (Between the Lakes). Present-day major population centres found within the boundaries of the Between the Lakes Purchase include Hamilton, Cambridge, Waterloo, Guelph, Brantford, and St. Catharines (Duric 2017a).

To recognize the Indigenous History the Township of West Lincoln, the following land acknowledgement has been developed:

The Township of West Lincoln, being part of Niagara Region is situated on treaty land. This land is steeped in the rich history of the First Nations such as the Hatiwendaronk (Hat-i-wen-DA-ronk), the Haudenosaunee (Hoe-den-no-SHOWee), and the Anishinaabe (Ah-nish-ih-NAH-bey), including the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. There are many First Nations, Métis, and Inuit people from across Turtle Island that live and work in Niagara today. The Township of West Lincoln, as part of the Regional Municipality of Niagara, stands with all Indigenous people, past and present, in promoting the wise stewardship of the lands on which we live. (Township of West Lincoln 2023)

3.1.2 LINCOLN COUNTY

European settlement in the area began around Niagara Falls and was followed by settlement on the shores of Lake Erie, Lake Ontario, and along the numerous rivers throughout the county. As roadways were surveyed and developed, settlement increasingly moved inland. In 1788, the Governor General of Canada issued a proclamation establishing districts across Upper Canada and the land that would become Lincoln County was included in the Nassau District.

Lincoln County, as a municipal entity, was formally established in 1798 and included the townships of Clinton, Saltfleet, Barton, Ancaster, Glanford, Binbrook, Gainsborough, Caistor, and Grimsby (Lincoln County Council 1956). In 1970, Lincoln County became part of the Regional Municipality of Niagara (Mika & Mika 1981). The first townships to be surveyed were located along the river in 1787. The layout of the lots differs from the rectilinear pattern of later townships. After the American Revolution, this area was one of the places where Pacifists and Loyalists funneled across the new border into British North America in order to escape retribution. The earliest settlers arrived before the official resettlement of Loyalists in 1783.

3.1.3 GAINSBOROUGH TOWNSHIP

In 1783, John Dochstader was one of the first settlers to Gainborough Township who arrived (Exploring Niagara 2020). There was a small schoolhouse located at Snyder's Mills and a Presbyterian Church in the Township by 1800. In 1818, there was also an Inn and a Methodist Church. The Township played an important role in the War of 1812, providing supplies such as rye, beef, pork and wheat to soldiers who were stationed at Niagara, proving the establishment of the area.

3.1.4 SAINT ANNS

The Study Area is located within the community of Saint Anns, which was settled as early as 1790, and originally was referred to as Snyder's Mills. The owners of Synder's Mills were Pennsylvania United Empire Loyalists Adam, and his wife Ann (Rayburn 1997). Ann Synder offered food to people that came to her door, so their homestead was referred to as St. Ann's (Exploring Niagara 2020).

3.1.5 COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUES

Based on a review of the Ontario Heritage Trust provincial plaque database there are no historical plaques located within the Study Area (Ontario Heritage Trust 2023).

3.2 REVIEW OF HISTORICAL MAPPING


Historical records and mapping were examined for evidence of early post-contact use of the Study Area. The Study Area was historically located within part of Lots 21 and 22, Concession 6, and Lots 21 and 22 Concession 5, former Township of Gainsborough, Lincoln County.

As shown in Table 1, the following historical records were examined, with a focus on historical features to identify historical settlements, buildings, and landscape features within the Study Area.



4 RESULTS

4.1 INFORMATION GATHERING

Susan Smyth, Senior Planner at the Township of West Lincoln, reported that there were no known built heritage resources or cultural heritage landscapes within the Study Area.

Sammuel Bayefsky, Provincial Heritage Registrar at the Ontario Heritage Trust, reported that the Study Area does not contain any Trust conservation easements or Trust-owned properties within the Study Area.

Karla Barboza, Team Lead at the MCM, reported that there are no properties designated under the OHA by the Minister within, or adjacent to, the Study Area, and the MCM is not aware of any provincial heritage properties within or adjacent to the Study Area.

4.2 FIELD REVIEW RESULTS

The Study Area was historically located within part of Lots 21 and 22, Concession 6, and Lots 21 and 22 Concession 5, former Township of Gainsborough, Lincoln County. The Study Area generally follows St. Ann's Road from Highway 20 in the south and Regional Road 69 in the north (Figure 1). The field review was undertaken from the public right of way.

4.2.1 HIGHWAY 20

Highway 20 travels north-south in the Study Area, and begins at Van Wagners Beach Road in Hamilton in the north-west and finishes at Stanley Avenue in Niagara Falls in the south-east. The road surface is asphalt and contains two lanes of traffic in both directions with gravel shoulders. The lands surrounding Highway 20 contain agricultural lands (Plate 1 to Plate 2).

No known or potential heritage properties were identified on Highway 20.

4.2.2 ST. ANN'S ROAD

St. Ann's Road travels north-south in the Study Area, and begins at Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road) in the north and finishes at Highway 20 in the south. The road surface is asphalt and contains one lane of traffic in both directions with dirt shoulders. The lands surrounding St. Ann's Road contain various agricultural lands and dwellings (Plate 3 to Plate 5).

Five potential heritage properties were identified on St. Ann's Road in the Study Area. For a detailed description of these properties, see Table 3 and for mapping of the locations of these properties, see Figure 7.

4.2.3 SIXTEEN ROAD

Sixteen Road travels east-west in the Study Area, and begins at Westbrook Road in the east and finishes at Effingham Street in the west. The road surface is asphalt and contains one lane of traffic in both directions with dirt shoulders. The lands surrounding Sixteen Road contain agricultural lands and various dwellings (Plate 8 to Plate 9).

No known or potential heritage properties were identified on Sixteen Road.

4.2.4 ATTEMA CRESCENT

Attema Crescent travels east-west and begins at St. Ann's Road in the east and ends at a circle in Attema Crescent in the west. The road surface is asphalt and contains one lane of traffic in both directions with dirt shoulders. The lands contain new construction houses (Plate 12 to Plate 13).

No known or potential heritage properties were identified on Attema Crescent.

4.2.5 REGIONAL ROAD 69 (TWENTY MILE ROAD)

Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road) travels east-west in the Study Area, and begins at Highway 20 in the east and finishes at Regional Road 24 (Victoria Avenue) in the west. The road surface is asphalt and contains one lane of traffic in both directions with gravel shoulders. The lands surrounding Regional Road 69 contain agricultural lands and various dwellings (Plate 17 to Plate 18).

Two potential heritage properties were identified on Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road) in the Study Area. For a detailed description of these properties, see Table 3 and for mapping of the locations of these properties, see Figure 7.

4.3 INVENTORY OF BUILT HERITAGE RESOURCES AND CULTURAL HERITAGE LANDSCAPES

After completing the background research, information gathering, and field review, an inventory was compiled of the built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes within the Study Area (Table 3). Figure 7 depicts the locations of identified built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes in relation to the Study Area.

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5 PRELIMINARY IMPACT ASSESSMENT

The MCM InfoSheet #5 gives guidance on how to complete impact assessments for built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes in the land use planning process (MCM 2006b). As discussed, the purpose of a preliminary impact assessment is to determine if identified built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes will be impacted by the proposed work.

This preliminary impact assessment considers two categories of impacts:

- **Direct Impact:** A permanent or irreversible negative affect on the CHVI of a property that results in the loss of a heritage attribute. Direct impacts include destruction or alteration.
- Indirect Impact: An impact that is the result of an activity on or near a cultural heritage resource that may adversely affect the CHVI and/or heritage attributes of a property. Indirect impacts include shadows, isolation, direct or indirect obstruction of significant views or vistas, a change in land use, or land disturbances.

It should be noted that land disturbances, as defined in MCM InfoSheet #5, and described above, also apply to archaeological resources. An archaeological assessment is beyond the scope of this study since recommendations regarding archaeological resources must be made by a professional archaeologist licensed by the MCM.

5.1 DESCRIPTION OF THE PROPOSED WORK

WSP's understanding is that the Township of West Lincoln intends to widen St. Ann's Road for improvements. The project will include road widening, culvert replacements, and intersection, rail crossing, and drainage improvements to St. Ann's Road limited to the public Right-of-Way. No property acquisition is proposed. Drawings of the proposed work are presented in Appendix A. Table 4 considers the potential impacts on the potential cultural heritage resources.

6 CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

WSP was retained by Kerry T. Howe Engineering Ltd. on behalf of the Township of West Lincoln (the Client) to complete a Cultural Heritage Report to support St. Ann's Road Reconstruction located in the Township of West Lincoln, Region of Niagara, Ontario.

Located in the community of Saint Anns, the Study Area was historically described as part of Lots 21 and 22, Concession 6, and Lots 21 and 22 Concession 5, former Township of Gainsborough, Lincoln County. The Study Area generally follows St. Ann's Road from Highway 20 in the south and Regional Road 69 (Twenty Mile Road) in the north.

The project will include intersection improvements, drainage improvements, bridge rehabilitation, railway crossing improvements, road reconstruction and other road/right-of-way features to St. Ann's Road, limited to the public Right-of-Way.

The results of background research, information gathering, and a field review determined that there are seven potential heritage properties located within the Study Area. The preliminary impact assessment determined that indirect impacts may occur to all seven potential heritage properties due to the close proximity of road widening construction activities, which may introduce the potential for vibration damage to historical structures.

Based on the above, WSP makes the following recommendations:

- 1 Avoidance of potential built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes is recommended from a cultural heritage perspective. The proposed work should be planned in a manner that avoids direct and indirect impact to identified built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes. Further, the locations of CHR 1- CHR 7 should be indicated on project mapping so that project personnel are aware of the presence of these potential built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes.
- 2 Vibration impacts are anticipated for all seven (7) heritage resources: CHR 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7. To mitigate impacts related to potential vibration impacts resulting from construction activities, WSP recommends that a qualified vibration specialist is consulted to develop an appropriate vibration monitoring program to avoid or reduce impacts to the identified historical structures.
- 3 Should future work require expansion of the St. Ann's Road Reconstruction Study Area, then a qualified heritage consultant should be contacted to confirm the impacts of the proposed work on the identified built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes.
- 4 This report should be submitted to the MCM for information purposes.

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

WSP's involvement will also allow for changes to be made as necessary to suit field conditions as they are encountered.


